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1. BACKGROUND

1.1 Colombo Plan

The Colombo Plan for Cooperative Economic and Social Development in Asia and the Pacific is a unique inter-governmental organization providing development assistance under the "Planning Prosperity Together" motto and the concept of self-help where member countries provide assistance to one another in socio-economic development.

The Colombo Plan was conceived at the Commonwealth Conference on Foreign Affairs held in Colombo, Ceylon (now Sri Lanka) in January 1950 and was established on 1 July 1951 as a cooperative venture for economic and social advancement of the people of South and Southeast Asia. It has grown from the founding group of seven Commonwealth nations - Australia, Britain, Canada, Ceylon, India, New Zealand and Pakistan — to twenty five including non-Commonwealth and countries belonging to the Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN) and South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation (SAARC). Current Colombo Plan member countries are Afghanistan, Australia, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Fiji, India, Indonesia, Iran, Japan, Republic of Korea, Lao PDR, Maiaysia, Maidives, Mongolia, Myanmar, Nepal, New Zealand, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Thailand, United States of America and Vietnam.

In December 1977 the Colombo Plan for Cooperative Economic Development in South and Southeast Asia was changed to The Colombo Plan for Co-operative Economic and Social Development in Asia and the Pacific, to reflect the expanded geographical composition of its enhanced membership and the scope of its activities. The primary focus of all Colombo Plan activities is human resources development in the Asia-Pacific region.

Over the years, contents of the Colombo Plan's training programmes have been adjusted to respond to the needs of member countries in a fast changing economic environment. In the early years, the training programmes were more of a long-term nature whilst the current programmes are established to provide advance skills and experience sharing, aimed at arriving at the best practices in different fields of economic and social activities for effective policy making and governance.

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1,2 Funding

A significant characteristic of the Colombo Plan is that the administrative costs of the Council and the Secretariat are borne equally by all member countries and all member countries have an equal status in Colombo Plan's functions and activities. However, programme activities are funded by voluntary contributions by member countries as development partners. In addition, non-member countries, other international and regional organisations and other donor agencies are also sourced for funding.

1.3 Current Programmes

In 1995, Colombo Plan revitalized its programmes to emphasize on short-term training courses in priority areas and promoting South-South cooperation. The current programmes of the Colombo Plan are in the areas of Public Administration and Environment Including postgraduate long-term scholarships, Private Sector Development and Drug Demand Prevention in member countries. In this regard, Colombo Plan has established three programmes for capacity building, namely, Drug Advisory Programme, Programme for Public Administration and Programme for Private Sector Development.

1.4 Programme for Public Administration & Environment

Programme for Public Administration and Environment (PPA) was established in 1995, following the revitalization of the Colombo Plan's structure and areas of focus. The primary objective of this program is to develop human capital in public sector of the developing member countries (DMCs), through long term and short term training programmes in prioritized areas such as project planning, IT management, economic planning, crisis management, education, public governance, gene based techniques and environmental issues such as air pollution management and Integrated environmental planning.

The PPA conducts training programmes for middle and senior level government officials of developing and under developed CPS member countries, through joint collaboration with partners like Malaysian Technical Cooperation Programme (MTCP), Thaliand International Development Cooperation Agency (TICA), Indian Millennium Fund Pakistan Technical Assistance Programme, Technical Cooperation Directorate of Singapore and the Government of Indonesia. The PPA has established good partnerships with centres of

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excellence in its member countries as well as with inter-governmental organisations to deliver training programmes in critical issues of development. From 1995 up to date, 1,621 government officials from CPS member countries have participated in PPA's training programmes.

The Long - Term Scholarship Programme (LTSP) which was a halimark of the Colombo Plan during its early years continued until 1989. Due to the needs of member countries, it was offered again in 2005 to provide opportunities for suitable candidates to pursue Master Degrees in prestigious universities in Korea, Malaysia and Thailand in a wide variety of subjects. In 2008, Singapore joined the other three countries to offer two (2) postgraduate scholarships at the National University of Singapore (NUS), Nanyang Technological University (NTU) or the Singapore Management University (SMU) in a wide variety of fields except Medicine and Dentistry.

1.5 Programme for Private Sector Development (PPSD)

The Proramme for Private Sector Development (PPSD) established in 1995, provides short term training programmes and workshops for the development of the private sector. The focus of PPSD is on capacity building of small and medium enterprises (SMEs), which in many economies drive the economic growth and create employment opportunities for a large segment of the labour force. The Programme's scope covers technology transfer, business management and sharing of best practices, World Trade Organization and trade issues and industrialization policy.

The PPSD has an important role to promote a business friendly environment through building up of capacity of those relevant government officers who are responsible to put in place supporting institutions, laws and policies as well as regulations which affect the private sector.

To obtain the best outcomes for these programmes, PPSD collaborates with member governments and their centres of excellence to implement the programmes. Our current partner agencies are Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA), National Productivity Centre, CMC Ltd under the Indian Millennium Fund. Since inception in 1995, Korea is the main donor for PPSD programmes.

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1.6 Drug Advisory Programme (DAP)

The Colombo Plan Drug Advisory Programme, established in 1973, was the first in the Asia Pacific regional programme to address the drug problem. From its inception, DAP has been contributing to the development of human resources in member countries by enhancing the capabilities of officials in government and non-governmental organizations involved in drug demand and supply reduction. DAP has played an instrumental role in the establishment of national drug focal agency in member countries.

Responding to the changing needs of member countries, which are facing multi-faceted problems due to lilicit drug production, trafficking and abuse, the DAP has embarked on several innovative strategies including faith-based approach to drug demand reduction, establishment of outreach and drop in centres and introduction of life skills to youths. DAP also mobilizes community in its drug demand reduction activities as well as provide advisory services and capacity building to member countries. In front line countries like Afghanistan and Pakistan, four (4) Outreach and Drop-In Centers (ODIC) were established in 2005 which continue to be supported by CPDAP. Two (2) other ODICs are in the Philippines. In the special programme for Afghanistan, in cooperation with the Ministry of Counter Narcotics and the Ministry of Public Health 16 treatment centers and transit shelter for women were set up in June 2007. DAP is operating two (2) Treatment Centers for women in Kabul and Balkh, Afghanistan.

In February 2009, DAP established a training center, Asian Center for Certification and Education of Addiction Professionals (ACCE). ACCE will offer two levels of credentials to the addiction professionals in Asia: National Certification Examination for Addiction Counselors levels 1 & 2. ACCE will register the first batch of participants for NCAC Level 1 in July 2009.

2. Environment Protection Training and Research Institute

Environment Protection Training and Research Institute (EPTRI) was set up in 1992 as an independent registered society by the Government of Andhra Pradesh with assistance from the Government of India. The State also provided bilateral assistance for technical collaboration between EPTRI and the Swedish International Development Co-operation Agency (Sida).

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EPTRI - a state of the art organisation is abreast of wide-ranging concerns regarding environmental conservation and protection from ozone depletion, climate change, integrated environmental strategies to clean development mechanisms. It endeavours to create awareness among communities, civil societies, Government Organizations, NGOs and other stakeholders. It strives to achieve poverty alleviation through employment generation, human development and sustainable environment management.

3. Course Contents

- Over view of Environmental Laws in India: Bio-Medical Waste Management and Handling Rules.
- Generation, Segregation and Collection of Bio-Medical Waste.
- Package, Storage, Transportation, Treatment Technologies and Disposal of Bio-Medical Waste.
- Characterization of Waste as per World Health Organization (WHO).
- Establishment of Common Bio-Medical Waste Treatment Facility.
- Frame Work for Regional Bio-Medical Waste Management Planning.
- Evaluation of Common Bio-Medical Waste Treatment Facility.
- Bio-Medical Waste Management Training in Masses World Bank Sponsored Program.
- Bio-Medical Waste Management in Rural Small Units.
- Bio-Medical Waste Minimization at Source.
- Regional Bio-Medical Waste Management Planning.
- Country Paper for Presentation (Existing Methods and Future Plan of Action).

4. Language

The whole training programme is conducted in English. National Focal points are kindly advised to nominate candidates with good command of English, both written and spoken.

5. Duration

This programme is scheduled from 06-18 December 2010. Participants should arrive in India one day earlier.

6. Invited Countries

8. Admission Criteria

- applicants must be nominated by the Colombo Plan National Focal Point of their respective Governments;
- hold a position in managerial level and possess a master degree;
- e job specifications are in line with the contents of the training program:
 - (i) Medical professionals
 - (II) Nursing staff
 - (III) Para-Medical staff
 - (iv) Environmental Engineers/ Scientists who are involved in managing blo-medical waste/regulating bio-medical waste management and also who wish to start common blo-medical waste treatment facility.

9. Pellowship

The scholarship award will cover:

- a round trip air ticket on economy class from the closest international airport to India
- Training costs
- per diem allowance
- accomedation

10. Visa

Participants attending this programme need to obtain at least a 5 week visa. Participating governments are kindly requested to bear the cost of visa application for their participants.


